




citement because this is the forefront of what's coming, and it will only get better.

### Any other advice for colleagues looking to evolve their practice?

I believe that it's such an exciting time to be a dentist now. For instance, if you look at the past 15 to 20 years, we had an onslaught of adhesive dentistry. Almost everyone can now do really refined bonding. We've mastered that.

Now let's back up and take a look at those patients who need dentures. In the same way that adhesive dentistry developed, technology is now emerging for

# Foundation Nakao for Worldwide Oral Health launching new round of research grant applications

Dental academics and clinicians are invited to apply for a research grant from Foundation Nakao for Worldwide Oral Health. This is the fourth round of funding made available by the prestigious organization since its founding in 2018.

Foundation Nakao supports clinical trials and research in important topics, such as minimum intervention dentistry and oral health of the elderly.

Successful applications will receive funding for their projects, up to \$52,000 per year in addition to wide exposure among dental professionals, the greater dental industry and the general public of each study's outcomes and achievements. Foundation Nakao will provide

funds for up to two years for a maximum grant total of \$104,000.

### Advancing oral health research

Foundation Nakao for Worldwide Oral Health's third round of grant applications took place in September 2021, and six studies were awarded the research grant. Applicants represented the following categories: government and nongovernment organizations, universities, research institutions and more.

Foundation Nakao supports academic

research and clinical studies contributing to its founding goal, which is the improvement of oral health and subsequent raised quality of life of all people in the world.

"The inspiration for the foundation came from a topic that is very close to our hearts: the impact of oral health on quality of life," said Makiko Nakao, president of Foundation Nakao for Worldwide Oral Health, at its official launch in 2018. "My husband and I believe that dentistry has a fundamental role to play in the health and longevity of people around the world. We look forward to seeing this becoming a reality through the activities of the foundation."

### Young people need to brush interdentally, too

"Dental professionals should instruct young patients to brush interdentally daily," said Prof. Denis Bourgeois. "This is important in order to avoid periodontal and systemic disease later in life."

Bourgeois was part of a team of researchers who evaluated the effect of daily interdental brushing in healthy young adults.

The results of the study showed that even the biofilm of healthy young adults contains pathogens responsible for periodontal disease.

Fortunately, daily use of interdental brushes can reduce the number of disease-causing bacteria and restore a healthy balance in the mouth.

For the study, which was conducted at the Université de Lyon in France, 19 different periodontal bacteria — including Porphyromonas gingivalis, Treponema denticola and Tannerella forsythia — were identified in the interdental biofilm of 25 participants. All the participants were between the ages of 18 and 35 and had no clinical signs of gingivitis.

The French researchers then aimed at evaluating how efficient daily calibrated interdental brushing was in reducing the number of periodontal pathogens in the young participants' mouths. During the course of three months, the number of bacteria associated with periodontal disease decreased drastically, allowing a reversion to a healthy symbiosis of the interdental microbiota.

The percentage of the test sites bleeding on interdental brushing was reduced from 68 percent to 10 percent, a reduction of 85 percent.



### The interdental space: Crucial but overlooked

"The explanation for the large number of pathogens in the interdental spaces of seemingly healthy young people is that the interdental space is an ecological niche where traditional brushing methods fail to disrupt biofilm," explained Bourgeois, co-author of the study.

A pioneer of oral prophylaxis, Bourgeois has conducted research on interdental biofilm management and interdental brushing techniques, both of which are yet to become commonplace.

"Using a normal toothbrush should be inseparably linked to using calibrated interdental brushes. The daily disruption of the interdental microbiota is crucial in order to re-establish and maintain symbiosis of the oral microbiome," he said.

"Interdental brushing should be universal," Bourgeois continued. "It does not only apply to adults with a history

of periodontal or peri-implant disease. Interdental brushing should be a daily habit also for young people. The argument that it is not possible to penetrate narrow, healthy interdental spaces is no longer valid. The newest generation of interdental brushes are small enough to access 99 percent of the interdental spaces of healthy young adults."

### Calibration is key

Interdental brushes are the most efficient when the bristles fill out the interdental space completely. For this reason, it is necessary for dental professionals to calibrate their patients' interdental spaces.

"Calibration means determining the correct diameter of interdental brush so that it will come into contact with all of the tissue surfaces of the interdental space where the microbiota are located," said Bourgeois. "For our study, we used Cura-

prox's interdental access probe to determine the necessary diameter. The probe is fundamental, compulsory. It is like a tuning fork for interdental prophylaxis."

### The role of dental professionals

Dental professionals should provide patients with the knowledge, tools and techniques they need in order to disrupt their interdental microbiomes on a daily basis.

"Dental universities need to teach individual prophylaxis to students," said Bourgeois. "Dental professionals should practice what they preach and, in turn, teach patients. Learning about the right brushing techniques and tools is a job for dental professionals. Then, it is their responsibility to pass this knowledge on to their patients and guarantee them an optimal quality of life."

Bourgeois concluded: "If every dental professional were to instruct patients about interdental brushing from adolescence, we would be able to prevent dental and periodontal complications caused by microbiota in adulthood. The positive impact this would have on patients' systemic health and well-being would be an added bonus."

The study, titled "Calibrated interdental brushing for the prevention of periodontal pathogens infection in young adults — a randomized controlled clinical trial", was published online on Oct. 22, 2019, in Scientific Reports.





### Growing numbers of women entering the profession

AAID-credentialed women dentists reflect on their career choice

According to the American Dental Association, women make up a recordbreaking 56 percent of incoming dental students, almost tripling the percentage who were first-year students in the '80s.

Three female dental leaders who have several decades of experience between them are AAID-credentialed dental implant experts Janice Wang, DDS, DABOI, Jasmine Sung, DDS, DABOI, and Polly Michaels, DMD, DABOI.

Sung believes recognizing and replacing teeth with dental implants is imperative to improving the quality of life of her patients. "My patients have become like family. They need to be comfortable with their procedures, so I strive to provide the highest quality care with integrity," she said.

After six years as a hospital-based dentist, Michaels started her own practice in 2010. She believes her experience with medically compromised patients allows her to complete complex surgeries with a

more predictable, long-term outcome in implants and prosthetics.

"Any existing issues are magnified in a medically complex patient, so it is of utmost importance that the care I provide is customized for each patient's success," she said

Wang describes AAID's program as the "best and safest practices in dental implantology — protecting the general public and providing dentists with extensive education and levels of credentials." With 19 years of experience in implantology, from extractions and bone grafts to implant placements and restorations, she

has found that "implants are usually the only logical, comfortable and conservative solution" for clients with missing or failing teeth.
